Remembering Tim Roser

In February the Boat Shop community lost a giant. Pastor Tim, as many of us called him, was perhaps the most down-to-earth reverend to grace the Boat Shop campus. He first came to the Boat Shop decades ago guiding a youth group, but many of us remember him by his other trade, as Lutheran Power and Light.

Over many years Tim gave lavishly of his time and his electrician's skills. He would drive over from his home in Madison, New Hampshire, camp out on a couch for a few nights, and by day he would be in basements, attics, corners, and crawlspaces running wire or upgrading aged parts. A handful of the significant projects that Tim did for us include:

- Running the electrical supply line to the Restoration Shop.
- Upgrading the circuit breakers in both farmhouses for improved fire safety.
- Installing the equipment that allows us to plug a generator into the side of the house and run pumps and freezers when we have a power outage.

Besides these special projects, Tim ran hundreds of feet of new wiring, installed countless fixtures, and with his son Matt changed countless fluorescent tube lights in the shop. At the dining table he would listen to apprentices' stories and share irreverent comments and tales of his own. After hours, he was a supportive friend to two generations of directors and staff.

We will miss Tim, and miss both his generous heart and his tell-it-like-it-is directness. He gave us so much.
